Pledge of Allegiance

Mr. John Bennett, Senior Policy Advisor, Council Office led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

2. PUBLIC COMMENT

Ms. Kseniya Kniazeva, Nomad Alliance, stated she invited some unsheltered individuals to attend this meeting because it was important for leaders to hear from them and to help find long-term solutions for the homeless crisis. Abatements are increasing, and it is causing individuals to feel suicidal, homicidal, and have breakdowns. Homeless individuals cannot stabilize to look for a job when they constantly have to move and take their possessions with them wherever they go. She asked the Council to consider sanctioned campgrounds for homeless people that contain small units, utilities, and bathrooms, and that are fenced and have a place for people to gather. Sanctioned campgrounds are not a permanent solution, but they can help individuals stabilize.

Mr. Russell Adams stated sanctioned campgrounds are needed and there are available spaces that could be used for those. Volunteers are also ready to help with case management and security. Security is important so people can go fill out job applications without having their possessions stolen. Police also take away homeless individuals' belongings when they abate a shelter because the people living there have to leave in a 20-minute parameter, and only have time to take whatever they can carry. Once people lose their belongings and their resources, it is hard to replace them. When there is an abatement, there is supposed to be a case manager and a 24-hour notice posted, but they has not been happening, and abatements have been occurring weekly, sometimes biweekly.

Ms. Stephanie (inaudible) stated prior to being homeless, she paid rent and took care of herself, but as soon as she became homeless, she began getting charges for trespassing and camping. Now, because of the charges, she cannot get an apartment because she cannot pass a background check. She has been sleeping on the street - on the sidewalk in a fold-up tent in various cities. Here, in Salt Lake City, she has found help at a homeless resource center on 400 West 200 South where there are other homeless people. Lunch and dinner are provided at that location, and people can use bathroom facilities and shower there. However, the buildings are closed from 8:00 PM to 6:30 AM, at which time there are no bathrooms. She asked if porta potties could be provided, maybe additional drinks, and another garbage container to help keep the place clean.

Ms. Mary Quigley stated these abatements need to be stopped. It is hard, and sometimes impossible, to replace belongings that are needed to survive. She also asked that homeless individuals start being treated like human beings, rather than scum and drug addicts, relaying an experience with police that made her and her husband feel like the scum of the earth in the manner they were asked to unpack their tent and move along.

Council Member Alvord asked why the shelters were not the preferred place to stay at night, and why people were sleeping in unauthorized areas.

Ms. Kniazeva stated there are a lot of rules and regulations at shelters that take away people's agency. There is a curfew of 10:00 PM, but a lot of homeless people are in the service industry and work at night, so they cannot stay there. Also, people can only bring in a certain amount of possessions, so the possessions they cannot take in with them often get stolen, and they need those possessions to survive in the event shelter is not available. There are also reports of theft and violence within shelters, disregard toward the patrons by staff, and cases of bedbugs, whereas, on the street, people can form bands of community who help take care of each other.

Mayor Jennifer Wilson stated the abatements are not meant to create hardship. They are done so the camps do not create a disadvantage for businesses and the community from a health perspective. With regard to sheltered environments, there are rules and conditions, and some people do not do well in those environments. The pressure of not having enough space can also create an environment where people feel traumatized. Then, individuals who have addiction issues are not willing to go in the shelters. There may be safety concerns as well with things they may be happening behind the scenes. She would support a camp, but the question is how to officially run it.

Council Member Granato reported she attended a graduation of the operators of heavy machinery training, where thirteen people graduated, including two women.

Council Member Stringham stated she attended the Performance Management Steering Committee meeting, which has made good progress. The committee will be reporting on some good news soon.

Council Member Alvord stated two of his children have taken positions with the County as lifeguards. His daughter, who was hired a year ago, had an opportunity to save the life of a child who was face down in the water at the South Jordan Recreation Center. It was terrifying and upsetting for her, but because of her training, she knew what to do, and the child is fine. Then, last week, his son was hired. He did not know if the County still had a shortage of lifeguards or not.

Mayor Jennifer Wilson expressed appreciation for Council Member Alvord's daughter, and hoped the County would get through the season without the staffing shortage it had in the past.

A RESOLUTION OF THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF SALT LAKE COUNTY APPROVING AND AUTHORIZING EXECUTION OF AN INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN SALT LAKE COUNTY AND RIVERTON CITY FOR A CONTRIBUTION OF TRCC FUNDS TO HELP FUND RENOVATION OF THE SANDRA N. LLOYD COMMUNITY CENTER

RECITALS

A. Salt Lake County ("the <u>County</u>") and Riverton City (the "<u>City</u>") are "public agencies" as defined by the Utah Interlocal Cooperation Act, Utah Code Ann. §§ 11-13-101 et seq. (the "<u>Act</u>"), and, as such, are authorized by the Act to enter into this Agreement to act jointly and cooperatively on the basis of mutual advantage in order to provide facilities in a manner that will accord best with geographic, economic, population and other factors influencing the needs and development of local communities.

B. The County receives funds ("<u>TRCC Funds</u>") pursuant to the Tourism, Recreation, Cultural, Convention, and Airport Facilities Tax Act, Utah Code Ann. §§ 59-12-601 et seq. (the "<u>TRCC Act</u>"). The TRCC Act provides that TRCC Funds may be used, among other things, for the development, operation, and maintenance of publicly owned or operated recreation, cultural, or convention facilities.

C. City requested TRCC Funds from the County to help it fund the

project described in its TRCC Application. More specifically, the City requested TRCC Funds to help fund the Sandra N. Lloyd Community Center Renovation (the "<u>Project</u>"). The County Council appropriated TRCC Funds for this purpose.

D. City and County now desire to enter into the Interlocal Cooperation Agreement attached hereto as ATTACHMENT A (the "<u>Interlocal Agreement</u>") wherein the County agrees to grant TRCC Funds to the City to help fund the Project and wherein the City agrees to abide by the terms and conditions outlined in the Interlocal Agreement.

E. The County Council believes that its contribution and assistance under the Agreement will contribute to the prosperity, moral well-being, peace, and comfort of Salt Lake County residents.

RESOLUTION

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, by the County Council of Salt Lake County:

1. That the Interlocal Agreement between Salt Lake County and Riverton City is approved, in substantially the form attached hereto as ATTACHMENT A, and that the Salt Lake County Mayor is authorized to execute the same.

2. That the Interlocal Agreement will become effective as stated in the Interlocal Agreement.

A RESOLUTION OF THE SALT LAKE COUNTY COUNCIL AUTHORIZING EXECUTION OF AN INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN SALT LAKE COUNTY AND MILLCREEK CITY REGARDING THE CONSTRUCTION OF A TRAILHEAD AND BRIDGE FOR THE JORDAN RIVER TRAIL ON THE MILLCREEK SIDE OF THE JORDAN RIVER

RECITALS

A. In 2022, the City was awarded a FY23 Community Development Block Grant ("CDBG") in the amount of Two Hundred Thirty One Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$231,400.00).

B. In 2023, the City expects to be awarded an additional CDBG in the approximate amount of Two Hundred Thirty One Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$231,400.00).

C. Also, in 2022, the City was awarded a One Million Five Hundred Ten Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,510,200.00) Active Transportation Grant ("ATG") from the Utah Department of Transportation ("UDOT").

D. The County is designing or has designed and intends to construct the following:

i. a trailhead for the Jordan River Trail ("JRT") on the Millcreek side of the Jordan River at approximately 961 West 3900 South (address) (the "Trailhead Project");

ii. an extension of the JRT on the Millcreek side of the river with a new bridge on four parcels located at 761, 797, 821 & 833 West 4060 South

(Phase I);

iii. and an additional trail extension to 4060 S (Phase II), (the "Bridge Project" comprises Phase I and II);

iv. the Bridge Project and the Trailhead Project may be collectively referred to as the "JRT Project."

E. The County has committed to paying upfront costs of the JRT Project up to a total of Three Hundred Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$330,000.00).

F. The City has contributed Two Hundred Seventeen Thousand Two Hundred Fourteen Dollars (\$217,214.00) in general funds to the JRT Project.

G. The City will also commit to the County FY23 CDBG funds in the amount Two Hundred Thirty One Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$231,400.00); FY24 CDBG funds in the amount of Two Hundred Thirty One Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$231,400.00); and ATG funds in the amount of One Million Five Hundred Ten Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,510,200.00); and an additional Ninety-Eight Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$98,400.00) of City general funds to complete the JRT Project (collectively referred to as the "Funds").

H. The Parties are "public agencies" as defined by the Utah Interlocal Cooperation Act, Utah Code Ann. §§ 11-13-101 *et seq.* (the "<u>Cooperation</u> <u>Act</u>"), and, as such, are authorized by the Cooperation Act to enter into this Agreement to act jointly and cooperatively in a manner that will enable them to make the most efficient use of their resources and powers.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED by the Salt Lake County Council that the Interlocal Cooperation Agreement is hereby approved, and the Mayor is authorized and directed to execute the Interlocal Cooperation Agreement, attached hereto as Exhibit 1 and to sign any other documents necessary to accomplish the purposes of the Interlocal Cooperation Agreement.
