
















Three Options

- Operational
- Legal
- Financial





Financial Impacts of Closure

- Best Case
- Most Likely Case
- Worst Case





Challenges

- Additional and Potential Loss of Waste Tonnage and Revenue
 - West Valley City \$1.5 Million in 2019
 - Possible other municipalities and haulers
- Operational
 - Regional Nature of Waste Management Program





Factors Influencing County Landfill Fees

- Transfer Station
- Green Waste
- Citizen Unloading
- Public Education and Outreach
- Owner Dividends \$3.50 per ton
- Extended Hours





Policy Considerations

- The County and the City are Equal Partners in the County's Waste Management Program
- Salt Lake County Does not Collect or Haul Municipal Waste. It is in the Disposal Business
- Salt Lake City Does Collect and Haul Municipal Waste
- The Transfer Station Benefits Waste Collectors and Haulers – Both Public and Private
- The Transfer Station Has Guaranteed a Consistent Waste Stream to the Landfill
