ORDINANCE NO. 1896

ESTABLISHING THE DATE ON WHICH THE JUNETEENTH INDEPENDENCE DAY HOLIDAY IS OBSERVED

AN ORDINANCE THE LEGISLATIVE OF BODY OF **SALT** LAKE COUNTY, **AMENDING SECTION** 1.06.020 OF THE UTAH, **SALT LAKE COUNTY CODE** OF ORDINANCES, 2001, **ENTITLED** "HOLIDAYS" **ESTABLISHING** THE **DATE** WHICH THE ON JUNETEENTH INDEPENDENCE DAY HOLIDAY IS OBSERVED.

The County Legislative Body of Salt Lake County ordains as follows:

SECTION I. The amendments made herein are designated by underlining the new substituted words. Words being deleted are designated by brackets and strike-through.

SECTION II. Section 1.06.020, of the Salt Lake County Code of Ordinances, 2001 is hereby amended to read as follows:

1.06.020 - Holidays.

A. The following days are legal holidays during which County offices are closed:

The First Day of January - New Years Day
The Third Monday of January - Martin Luther King Day
The Third Monday of February - President's Day
The Last Monday in May - Memorial Day

The Nineteenth Day of June - Juneteenth Independence Day

The Fourth Day of July - Independence Day

The Twenty-fourth Day of July - Pioneer Day

The First Monday of September - Labor Day

The Eleventh Day of November - Veteran's Day

The Fourth Day of November - Thanksgiving

The Fourth Friday of November - Day After Thanksgiving

The Twenty-fifth day of December - Christmas Day

- B. In the event that a holiday falls on a Saturday, it shall be observed on the preceding Friday. In the event that a holiday falls on a Sunday, it shall be observed on the following Monday. If June 19 is on a Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, or Friday, the Juneteenth Independence Day holiday shall be observed on the immediately preceding Monday. If June 19 is on a Saturday or Sunday, the Juneteenth Independence Day holiday shall be observed on the immediately following Monday.
- C. Where public business requires, some County offices may be required to remain open for business on legal holidays.

SECTION III. This ordinance shall become effective fifteen (15) days after its passage and upon at least one publication in a newspaper published and having general circulation in Salt Lake County.
