


HHW Program Development

- 2008 Collection of Ewaste




HHW Program Growth

Facility Future

- A new indoor conveniently located facility much like other jurisdictions and municipalities have provided for their residents.
- Which will:
 - Provide better customer service.
 - Create a safer work environment for employees.
 - Increase reuse and recycling potential in the Valley.
 - Increase the rate of collection.





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Financing a new Facility

- Program operations are funded by a fee that is assessed at both private & public landfills/processing facilities in Salt Lake County. This fee annually brings in an estimated \$2.5 million.
- In 2013 the County created an Assigned Fund which will have an estimated balance of \$2.4 million at end of 2019 that is dedicated to the program's sustainability.
- Estimated cost to build an indoor permanent facility is \$4.7 million. The \$2.4 million Assigned Fund balance will be put towards the building costs, and the balance funded with the remaining bond proceeds and New Market Tax Credit savings from the downtown Health building project.
