

Weber State University's Mary Elizabeth Dee Shaw Gallery- is pleased to present a solo retrospective of work by Ogden born artist Ginger Wallace from May 9 through August 6, 2016.

About the artist:

"Ginger Ellis Wallace was born in Ogden, Utah, in 1924 to parents Wallace and Gene Browning Ellis, who believed that a daily dose of laughter was required for one to remain healthy. Ginger thus filled her life with whimsical art, practical jokes, outrageous parties, and lots of family and friends. She attended the University of Utah before graduating with a BFA and MFA from the Art Institute of Chicago. She studied photography at the Chicago Institute of Design and Utah State University. While in Chicago in the early 1950s, she operated The 750 Studio, which exhibited the works of many local and national artists. Art was the center of her life. She painted in both abstract and realist styles; excelled in portraiture; sculpted in clay and paper mache; spent a summer in Taxco, Mexico, learning the marriage of metals; crafted jewelry from bronze, silver and enamel; and created 16 mm films to rival any French surrealist. After marrying Bob Wallace, she moved to San Diego, where they reared their children, Janet Wallace, Matthew Wallace, and Sally (Scott) Browning, immersed in humor and color. Her final one-person show, Ginger Wallace: Her Art, Her Wit and Relationships, was held at the San Diego Art Institute in 2007. Ginger Wallace passed away in 2010."
