Pledge of Allegiance

Ms. Corinne Johnson, Senior Policy Advisor, Council Office, led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

2. CITIZEN PUBLIC INPUT

Dr. Brian Moench spoke on behalf of Utah Physicians for a Healthy Environment in opposition to a proposal to log Northern Utah's forest as a solution to delivering more water to the Great Salt Lake. Research indicates that killing trees to increase flow to streams does not have a consistent result, and in fact, the opposite may occur. If increased flow does occur, it is minor, temporary, and mainly happens in the form of increased flooding, and it does not increase water storage. Claims that forests are tinderboxes because they are overgrown and unhealthy and logging is a cure is largely a myth and has been debunked by numerous independent experts. In fact, Dr. David Lindenmayer, author of 48 books on forests, said logged forests always burn at greater severity than intact forests. The climate crisis is the main driver of western forest and fire vulnerability, not tree density or excessive fuels. In fact, dense tree areas act as windbreaks, retain moisture, and decrease forest temperatures. Furthermore, burning the biomass after trees are thinned not only releases carbon into the atmosphere, but also sacrifices a critical pathway for carbon absorption long into the future. Then, when trees are burned while there is still snowpack, the carbon falls onto the snow, warming it and accelerating snowpack loss. Forest thinning is a waste of taxpayer money; government should focus water conservation by hardening home requirements. Utah Physicians for a Healthy Environment is asking the Council to formally reject this proposal.

Mayor Jennifer Wilson stated she had two items regarding County employees stepping up. First, Catherine Kanter, Deputy Mayor of Regional Operations, and Visit Salt Lake worked together to get a shuttle service up Little Cottonwood Canyon. That was launched, and to date, reports showed that 780 of the 800 seats available were filled and that locals and tourists were happy with it. She also acknowledged the Sandy City police who escorted the buses up to the front of the line.

Secondly, due to the cold temperatures, Parks and Recreation opened Central City Recreation Center last night after closure to 40 unsheltered individuals. There were efforts made throughout the evening to go out and find people who needed shelter. Martin Jensen, Director, Parks and Recreation Division said last night was calm and and that people left peacefully the next morning before the recreation center opened, and some of them helped clean up. Parks and Recreation staff members volunteered, along with people from Salt Lake City and Unsheltered Utah. Tonight, they are opening it again, and there is capacity for 90 unsheltered individuals.

FLEET MANAGEMENT BOARD MEMBERSHIP AMENDMENT

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 2.40.020, ENTITLED BOARD MEMBERSHIP. SELECTION OF CHAIR. AND LENGTH OF TERMS: REPLACING THE AUDITOR'S POSITION ON THE FLEET MANAGEMENT BOARD REPRESENTATION FROM THE WITH TREASURER'S OFFICE; AND OTHER RELATED CHANGES

The County legislative Body of Salt Lake County ordains as follows:

SECTION 1. The amendments made herein are designated by underlining the new substituted words. Words being deleted are designated by brackets and interlineations.

SECTION 2. Chapter 2.40.020(A) of the Salt Lake County Code of Ordinances, 2001, is amended to read as follows:

2.40.020 - Board membership, selection of chair, and length of terms.

A. The board shall be appointed by the mayor with advice and consent of the county council. The board shall consist of seven representatives, selected as follows:

1. One named representative of the mayor's fiscal staff, and a named alternate representative who may act and vote in the absence of the named representative, selected by the mayor;

2. One named representative from the council staff, and a named

alternate representative who may act and vote in the absence of the named representative, selected by the county council;

3. One named representative from the <u>treasurer's</u> [auditor's] office, and a named alternate representative who may act and vote in the absence of the named representative, selected by the county <u>treasurer</u> [auditor];

4. One named representative from the sheriff's office, and a named alternate representative who may act and vote in the absence of the named representative, selected by the county sheriff;

5. Two representatives from vehicle-using divisions or offices of the county, and one named alternate representative for each of the two representative who may act and vote in the absence of the named representative, selected on a rotating basis [by] from the assessor, district attorney, mayor and surveyor once the representative from the prior divisions's term ends.

6. One representative from the public.

SECTION III: This ordinance shall become effective fifteen (15) days after its passage and upon at least one publication of the ordinance or a summary thereof in a newspaper published and having general circulation in Salt Lake County.

A RESOLUTION OF THE SALT LAKE COUNTY COUNCIL CONDITIONALLY AGREEING TO THE CREATION OF AN ISLAND FROM THE PROPOSED LARK AREA ANNEXATION BY SOUTH JORDAN CITY

WHEREAS, South Jordan City was served with a notice of intent to file a petition to annex what the petition sponsor has titled the Lark Area Annexation, as shown on the map attached as Exhibit A, which if accepted by South Jordan City could lead to a portion of what is currently unincorporated Salt Lake County being annexed into South Jordan City; and

WHEREAS, the proposed annexation is being pursued under and controlled by Utah State Code Sections 10-2-401, *et seq.*; and WHEREAS, currently, the proposed annexation would create an unincorporated island and pursuant to Utah Code Section 10-2-402(1)(b)(iii) (B); an unincorporated area may not be annexed to a municipality if the annexation will create an unincorporated island unless the County and municipality otherwise agree; and

WHEREAS, Herriman City has accepted an annexation petition titled the Rana Toro Annexation, as shown on the map attached as Exhibit B, that could successfully annex the island prior to or simultaneously with the effective date of the Lark Area Annexation and, thus, there would in fact not be an island created by the proposed Lark Area Annexation as illustrated on the map attached as Exhibit C showing the combined Lark Area and Rana Toro annexations; and

WHEREAS, the sponsors of the Lark Area Annexation assert that the Rana Toro Annexation will be competed before or simultaneously with the Lark Area Annexation; and

WHEREAS, although the County's consent may ultimately not be required because the proposed annexation may not result in the creation of an unincorporated island, the annexation process which is intended to allow all interested parties to review the proposed annexation to determine if it is lawful and has sufficient community support could be needlessly complicated due to questions regarding the County's consent;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, THAT:

Although the consent of Salt Lake County may ultimately not be required, to avoid any complications and uncertainty, Salt Lake County conditionally agrees to the creation of the unincorporated island shown in Exhibit A that would result if South Jordan City accepts, certifies, and approves, the proposed Lark Area Annexation and is otherwise able to meet the requirements of Utah State Code Sections 10-2-401, *et seq.*, and successfully annex the proposed annexation area. However, if Salt Lake County determines that Herriman City will be unable to successfully complete the Rana Toro Annexation and annex the unincorporated island before the Lark Area Annexation is scheduled to be finalized, Salt Lake County may, at its sole discretion, conduct a full review of the proposed annexation and withdraw its conditional consent to the creation of an unincorporated island.
